MIECHV Collaboration at Its Best



What is the MIECHV Project?

- Improve outcomes for at-risk children and families through evidence-based home visiting programs.
- Established in 2010 and is administered by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the Administration for Children and Families (ACF).
- MIECHV grants are made to states and tribal communities to "deliver effective services to pregnant women, expectant fathers, and parents and primary caregivers of young children birth to kindergarten

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How is the funding used?

- States and tribal communities develop unique plans to target funding to particular communities identified through needs assessments.
- Each state or tribal community can opt to use one or more evidence-based home visiting models. One of those models is the Early Head Start Home Visiting Model, based on the Early Head Start home-based option.

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Anticipated benefits may include:

- Coordinated statewide home visiting needs assessments
- Potential for enhanced role of Head Start State Collaboration
 Offices in coordinating statewide home visiting services
- Additional training materials and resources for home visiting programs and staff
- Increased capacity for comprehensive statewide early childhood systems
- Access to in-depth evaluation information on the Early Head Start Home Visiting Model
